### **Disaster Relief and International Cooperation**

Following the earthquake, tsunami and the nuclear power plant accident that devastated Japan, we decided to hold this public forum to discuss the impact and the implications of 3.11. Is peaceful use of nuclear energy sustainable, and are there realistic alternatives to nuclear energy? What is the effect of the accident on the economy and environment?
